<p>Some courses may appear on more than one of <b>LISTS H, S, and C</b>. A cross-listed course may apply to only one of the required areas specified by the lists.</p> <p><b>32</b> hours of coursework at the <b>300</b> level or higher must be taken on the <b>IUPUI</b> campus.</p> <p>A single grade of <b>D or D+</b> will be allowed for one course only in <b>AREAS IIIC &amp; IIID</b>.</p> <p>Science courses over 10 years old must be approved by the <b>Associate Dean for Academic Program</b>. At the discretion of the department, courses taken outside of the <b>School of Science and Liberal Arts</b> must receive departmental approval. No more than 6 hours of clinical, athletic, or performing arts types will be approved.</p>	<p>First year experience course is to be taken by beginning freshmen or students who are transferring with fewer than <b>18</b> credit hours.</p> <p>No more than <b>64</b> credit hours earned in accredited junior colleges can be applied toward a degree.</p> <p>Any science major who is not enrolled at <b>IUPUI</b> for two consecutive years or more, and who returns to the <b>School of Science</b> will be placed in the current bulletin.</p>
